The *Family Empowerment Center* (FEC) helps families navigate the school system by helping parents better understand their child's educational and developmental needs, the IEP process, promote alternative dispute resolution, and support positive relationships between parents and schools. 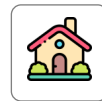
DISABILITY RIGHTS CALIFORNIA ●

They provide case management to young adults in permanent supportive housing located in Santa Maria. In addition, their Rapid Rehousing program assists with housing navigation, along with rental and security deposit assistance. HACSB provides affordable housing as well as supportive services to eligible persons with limited incomes. Supportive Housing is designed for individuals in need of supportive services. Services vary depending on the property, but can include case management, job placement assistance, mental health counseling, and independent living skills. *For more information, visit www.hacsb.org/housing/supportive-housing.*

Housing Choice Voucher Program is the federal government's program for assisting eligible very low-income families, elderly, and disabled individuals afford decent and safe, housing in the private market. HOUSING AUTHORITY OF THE COUNTY OF SANTA BARBARA (HASBARCO) ●

HASBARCO provides affordable housing opportunities for veterans, seniors, youth transitioning out of Foster Care, individuals experiencing homelessness, persons with disabilities and low-income working families/individuals. Operating through a central administrative office in Lompoc and housing management and maintenance offices in Goleta, Lompoc, and Santa Maria, the Housing Authority provides direct services to applicants, tenants, and private property owners throughout Santa Barbara County, with the exception of the City of Santa Barbara. They own and manage nearly 1,600 affordable rental units, including permanent supportive housing, and administers the federal Housing Choice Voucher Program (Section 8). HASBARCO's Permanent Supportive Housing is designed for individuals who are homeless or formerly homeless and in need of permanent supportive services. The Resident & Supportive Services Department provides housing retention support to residents, including case management, rental assistance, and referrals to community resources. HOUSING TRUST FUND OF SANTA BARBARA (HTF) ●

Children's Center provides high-quality, trauma-informed early childhood care and education programs for children from three months to five years old. Applicants must qualify as having a diagnosed mental illness or hold a job in the designated downtown area. Eleanor Apartments are a small, affordable complex for families in which one or more adults has been diagnosed with a mental illness. In addition to housing, they help residents and family members with mental health needs obtain resources, including a day-use recovery program for adults, classes and wellness activities for teenagers and adult residents, a family advocate that serves as a liaison for NAMI Santa Barbara County, and youth mental health education. *For more information, call (805) 884-8440 or visit www.mentalwellnesscenter.org.*
